



#### Artist Statement

- Humorism is an outdated medical theory established around 500 B.C. and remained influential until the 1800s.
- An excess of any one of four humors in the body presumably resulted in a distinct emotional state.

Those with an excess of phlegm were believed to be phlegmatic in temperament: calm, peaceful, and apathetic; it was often associated with old age.

Yellow bile was associated with adolescence and a choleric temperament: anger, aggression, and quick temper.

Blood was associated with childhood and a sanguine temperament: happiness, hope, and playfulness.

Black bile was associated with adulthood and a melancholic temperament: depression and despondence.



# Phlegmatic

- Blood was associated with childhood and a sanguine temperament: happiness, hope, and playfulness.

- Oil and Acrylic on Canvas
- Yellow bile was associated with adolescence and a choleric temperament: anger, aggression, and quick temper.



- Black bile was associated with adulthood and a melancholic temperament: depression and despondence.
